Title: Materials Science and Engineering (MSE) 500 | Modern Concepts in Materials Science

Credits: 3

Sections: Local (301) and distance education (601)

Description: "Fundamentals of structure, structure modification and properties of materials with emphasis on structure-property relationships and modern theory of solids"

Learning outcomes:

- Discuss, understand, and compare the structure of crystalline and amorphous solids
- Identify the structure and chemistry of point, line, and planar defects in solids
- Read and interpret unary and binary phase diagrams
- Understand the crystalline lattice and the nomenclature used to describe it
- Articulate the physical properties associated with ceramic, semiconducting, metallic, and amorphous solids
- Understand the roles of thermodynamics and kinetics in regulating phase transitions

Course structure: This course will be completely online in an asynchronous format; all lectures, assignments, and take-home exams will be obtained via **Moodle**. Therefore, there will be **no in-person/virtual meeting dates and times**. Course material can be accessed each week whenever one is able to do so, including prerecorded lectures via **Panopto**, lecture slides, the textbook, etc.; however, there will be homework assignments, exams, and course participation tasks due during the semester.

Textbook: Callister, William D. & Rethwisch, David G. Materials Science and Engineering: An Introduction, 10th Edition. Hoboken, NJ:Wiley.

Other recent editions (8th and 9th) would be okay as well. Earlier editions may also be fine, but please keep in mind that there may be some differences. Depending on the edition, this textbook may be available in a printed format and/or a digital format (e-book). NC State is providing **temporary free access** to the 10th edition of the e-book through its **All-In Digital Textbook program** up to **Jan. 23rd, 2024**. During this free-access period, one will have the option to purchase this e-book from NC State at a discounted price, listed at **\$80.50** (**lifetime access**), if purchased **before Jan. 23rd**. This is one option available; the textbook could be purchased, rented, or checked out/borrowed elsewhere, depending on one's preference.

- Homework assignments (HWs): Tentatively, seven homework assignments are planned for the semester and will be based on the textbook. HWs will be graded based on both effort and correctness; however, most of the points will be based on showing work, including reasonable units (if applicable), and using expected notations (if applicable).
- **Course participation:** There will be a course participation Moodle forum. For each half of the course (before and after the midterm exam), each participant is requested to start at least one substantive forum thread about a course topic and to post at least one substantive reply in another participant's thread or in one's own thread (i.e., each participant would have at least four posts total for the entire semester 1 new thread and 1 reply for the 1st half of the course and 1 new thread and 1 reply for the 2nd half of the course). These "substantive" posts will be graded based on completeness (meeting a set of criteria described at the top of the forum) and effort (not correctness).
- **Exams:** All exams will be take-home (open-book/note), non-cumulative exams. Similar to the HWs, exams will be graded based on both effort and correctness.
- Access and submission methods: All HWs and exams will be accessible via Moodle within an HW/exam module or section. One would download the PDF document, complete the HW/exam, and then upload a single PDF of responses for the HW/exam. If printing and completing the HW/exam by hand, one can use a scanner, scanner app, etc. to prepare a single PDF; please confirm that the scanned content is clear and legible.
- **Timing:** Unless noted otherwise, HWs are intended to be due within one week from the date given/assigned. For example, the 1st HW (covering lectures 1 to 4) will be tentatively given on Thurs., Jan. 18th and will be tentatively due by 11:59 pm ET on Wed., Jan. 24th. A 36-hour time window is tentatively planned for the exams. Given and due dates/times will be posted on the Moodle course site.
